HOA Fencing Update: A Collaborative Solution

Last summer, our community gathered for a special outdoor meeting to discuss the board's proposal to remove fencing in a portion of the common areas within the HOA. Homeowners shared valuable input, voicing their concerns and suggestions about how the change would impact their properties.


Initially, the board revised its plan to allow the perimeter fence around the affected units to remain. However, after further discussion and consideration, the board proposed a new approach: reclassifying the impacted area to a limited common area. This proposal was presented to the affected homeowners, and the majority agreed to the change. As a result, the responsibility for maintaining these fences and lawncare will now shift to those homeowners, leading to an estimated HOA cost savings of \$3,200 or more a year.

The map below illustrates the updated plan:

- Areas outlined in red will retain all fencing.
- Areas without red outlines will have fences and gates removed, with the exception of property line fences and existing partition walls between some units.

This outcome reflects the power of community collaboration. By working together, we have found a solution that not only accommodates homeowners' needs but also reduces costs, allowing the HOA to allocate funds to other priorities within our aging community.

Red Curbing

The "No Parking" signs might be gone, but parking in those areas is strictly prohibited. The signs were removed for mowing and lawn care ease. These redpainted zones are reserved for specific purposes. Parking in these areas may obstruct critical access for emergency services. It is important that all parking regulations are obeyed by all residents. It is a matter of consideration and respect for the community and your neighbors.

Here's a look at some upcoming initiatives designed to preserve and enhance our shared spaces:

• Reserve Study Update: Planning for Our Community's Future

As our property continues to age, proper planning is essential to ensure we can maintain and improve our shared spaces. To proactively address this, our Board President and Vice President will be conducting a new reserve study to assess our long-term financial needs.

• Dog Waste Stations
